





Recently I have been doing a little survey.


stuck writing this comic and I said to myself: "Hey, I could ask my students and maybe get some ideas!"


I've been discussing with more than 200 students aged 14 to 19.

Can they feel any emotional attachment to EU?








European Union was founded on great values.
