



Local Politics and Citizen's Participation

16 – 28 October 2022

Gummersbach, Germany

Abstract

“All politics is local” is a well-known phrase and with the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have seen how important it is that citizens are active in order to protect and promote their community's interests and needs. How we participate in local decision-making may be changing but our participation as active citizens' is key for liberals and the success of liberal democracy. Stressing the importance of local politics is a key part of liberal values, starting off from the individual, who should be instrumental in all decisions that affect their life. Looking for solutions at the local level, involving responsible individuals and making use of decentralised local competences and knowledge are important principles to bring local government politics close to citizens, encourage their participation, communicate with them more effectively and make government more responsive.

However, we know that local politicians around the world are facing many challenges to implement such principles due to administrative, legal, financial, political and practical problems. The world is changing rapidly and how we govern at local level needs to consider topics such as building the resilience of communities and our environment, digitisation and smart cities, enhancing our local market economies and finding liberal local solutions to the social and welfare needs of our citizens in our communities.

Communication methods have also become diverse, and the digital space is now an important platform for citizens to actively organise, communicate with each other and their local authorities. Digital communication methods have made communication much easier across the world, but at times more challenging for effective engagement.

The seminar will cover ideas on a necessary framework for an effective local government. We will also discuss practical concepts on how to work successfully at a local level in given situations with numerous limitations beyond the decision-making power of councillors and mayors.

OBJECTIVES

During the seminar our objectives will be to:

- gather a group of like-minded peers in order that we can actively build relationships with one another, and share experiences of local government and how we can encourage active citizenry and strong local governments in our own contexts;

- engage with other leaders with experiences in order that we can learn from their insights;
- explore ways that you can build communities of support around yourself and expand your influence;
- develop the skills needed to be an impactful leader; and
- reflect on the state of local politics in the world, and ways you would like to contribute after the seminar through some agreed personalised steps.

TOPICS

The seminar will focus on:

Local government politics and liberalism

- Why are local self-administration, subsidiarity, decentralisation and participation key liberal concepts? Why is local government such an important sphere of government, particularly to liberals?
- How can we implement these concepts? Which frameworks are necessary? (legal, financial etc.)
- Analysis of our own countries: the legal environment and the autonomy of local government to make its own decisions.
- How do we develop, protect and grow local government autonomy?
- Is local government politics 'non-ideological'? Is there a specific liberal approach?
- Where are achievements / best practice examples and deficits / needs in our countries?

Reform ideas for local government

- How to create a citizen oriented, efficient, democratic and responsible (non-corrupt) local administration? What are our priorities as liberal politicians?
- How do we build resilience into all of our decision-making?
- How do we use technology (such as e-government and smart cities) to improve the environment for our citizens and reduce inequalities?

Participation as an element of good governance on local level

- Formal and informal means of citizens' participation; participation in the digital age
- Information rights, initiative rights and decision rights
- How can we enhance citizens' engagement in local politics?
- Where are achievements / best practice examples and deficits / needs in our countries?
- What should be the role of civil society and their institutions such as NGOs and citizens groups?

The importance of effective communication – listening, engaging and communicating

- How do we use media to communicate with our residents – what are the most effective ways of communicating with our residents as a local government but also as individual liberal politicians, activists and NGOs?
- The importance of listening and understanding in effective communication

Local politics, political parties and civil society

- How can we use participation and citizen orientation as instruments to increase political success? What does this mean for structures and strategies of political parties? Local government level as a particular chance for opposition parties to change voting patterns
- How can we make a difference for our residents? Creating 'centres of excellence' despite difficult framework conditions and building momentum in voters' minds about what we can do for their daily well-being.
- Where are achievements / best practice examples and deficits / needs in our countries.

TARGET GROUP

- 1) Active liberal local government politicians such as councillors, mayors or representatives of local party branches.
- 2) Representatives of liberal NGOs and citizen groups who focus in particular on local politics and citizenry.
- 3) Politicians or individuals involved with issues of local government.
- 4) Functionaries of liberal political parties who are involved in training of local politicians or consolidating party structures on local level.

METHODOLOGY

In this seminar, we are going to focus on the above-mentioned topics and themes and look for answers involving the views and experiences of all our participants as well as external contributors. This seminar is a highly interactive experience. Participants will be required to engage actively, utilising a wide range of participation techniques. This will include working groups, simulation exercises and practical individual work.

Some sessions will have the entire group of participants working together, while at other times we will break into smaller groups. There will also be readings, 1-on-1 meetings with the facilitators and support team.

There will be an introductory meeting a few days before the start of the seminar to familiarise everyone with the seminar arrangements, details will be provided.

We will provide programme details for the seminar to registered participants.
